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I. Academic Information

1. Curriculum

CBU's MBA in CED program shares the general MBA program philosophy. In CBU's MBA in CED program, students must complete the required 15 courses and their Applied Research Essay to earn 48 credits. Thirteen (13) of the 15 courses are mandatory/core and 2 courses are electives. Students pursuing a general MBA in CED have the choice of selecting two courses from a set of general electives or they can mix and match general electives and electives specific to areas of specialization. The electives and the Applied Research Project enable learners to focus their degree in a topical *Option*. A summary of program requirements follows:

2. Course Load

All MBA in CED courses are three-credit courses which typically include 32 hours of classroom contact time. A part-time MBA in CED student on campus should not enroll for more than 3 courses per semester, with 2 courses being the practical maximum. A full-time student carries 3-5 courses per semester. The maximum load for a graduate student is 5 courses in one semester. Considering that MBA in CED courses are offered on campus in three terms per year, one has the opportunity to complete all courses in a timely fashion, without having to take too

many courses at once. Similarly, the off-campus alternate-weekend delivery is a paced format that works well for working people.

MBA students should keep in mind that graduate courses require much more time and effort than undergraduate courses: to read, research, analyze, organize, write, and present on course assignments. Every effort should be made to manage outside work and life duties and build adequate study and homework time into one's schedule.

3. Applied Research Project Overview (MBAC6801)

The Applied Research Project (previously known as the Major Research Essay) is completed after all courses have been completed. CBU organizes seminar-style workshops ("boot-camp"), led by an experienced academic that meet to pace and support learners as you write your thesis. The Applied Research Project forces students to learn how to ask their own questions in a topic of interest: learn to develop a thesis, frame the research question, conduct literature review and develop the theoretical framework, adopt the appropriate methodology, carry out the research, analyze the results, and summarize conclusions. The research project provides another avenue for learners to gain deep insights in an area of interest and it can become the means of improving their knowledge in a specialization that will advance their career, their organization, and the community. Don't worry; you will receive much more information on the Applied Research Project as the program progresses.

4. MBA Student Advising

The MBA in CED is a graduate program with specific core and elective requirements adapted to each student's prior learning, care must be exercised in choosing and registering courses. As we do not have your prior academic records encoded in CBU's student information system, the system cannot automatically verify that you have the appropriate prerequisite courses and that your new course selections will fit the MBA in CED Degree plan.

The MBA office must advise you on course selection and sign off on the course registration form. Your registration form must be signed by the MBA office before taking it to the Student Service Centre to register. Off-campus students register for their courses by emailing the MBA office **Anne_Chiasson@cbu.ca**.

5. Course Registration

Students register each term according to the instructions issued by the MBA office and the Registrar's office. Registration typically begins in June for new students starting in July or September, and in December for students starting in January.

Off-campus students will be notified via email to register 2-3 weeks before the course begins. Course registrations do not get processed until payment of the tuition fees is received. The pay-as-you-register model enables students to spread tuition payments over time and adapt the payments to their personal financial situation.

Students can use CBU's Student Online Access (SOLA) system to view grades, transcripts, class & exam schedules, and course offerings. MBA students cannot register online, as explained above.

6. Grades

The passing grade in MBA courses is 70 percent. A course cannot be repeated more than two times; three failures lead to dismissal from the program. A student is expected to maintain a cumulative grade average of 70 percent (B) also to remain in the MBA program.

Reassessment of Final Grades: Application for reassessment of a final grade should be made to the Director. The student must provide a letter to the Director stating specifically which assignments are being requested to be reassessed and the specifics of why the student believes the original grade was unfair; if the assignments have been returned to the student they must be included with the application for reassessment. The only grounds for application for reassessment are that the student believes that the grading criteria were inconsistently applied to that individual student, whether through error, carelessness or discrimination. Applications for reassessment must be received within one month of the end of the term in which the disputed mark was assigned. Grades may be raised or lowered through the reassessment.

The Director will first request the instructor who issued the mark to review the materials submitted along with the final examination. If the result of this preliminary review does not change the final grade, the student may request a formal reassessment. This request must be accompanied by a payment of \$25, which will be refunded if the grade is raised.

The Director will then empanel two faculty members, one selected by the instructor and the other by the student requesting the reassessment; both members of the panel shall have expertise in the discipline of the assignments being reassessed. The panel will review the written work by the student in question; the panel will endeavour to utilize the same criteria originally used to grade the other students in the class, to the extent that it is possible to do so. If the two members cannot agree on a mark, the average of the two re-assessments will be assigned. The Director will submit the decision of the panel to the Registrar to record the revised grade. The panel's decision may be appealed to Cape Breton University's Appeals Committee. If the grade being reassessed is that of the Director, then the Dean shall carry out the duties as specified in this section.

7. Prior Learning Assessment

The MBA in CED program values both formal and informal learning, and career experience, but it does <u>not</u> extend credits for life experience. Credit may be extended on a combination of coursework and experience that makes up the equivalent of outcomes of the MBA in CED course. Methods of determining prior learning may include: assessment of formal credentials and portfolios, challenge examinations, and demonstration of skills. A Prior Learning Assessment Application and supporting documentation is reviewed by the Director in consultation with subject-area professors, and assessment/recommendation is reviewed and approved by the Dean.

Credit Transfer Policies and Requirements: CBU is sensitive to the time and monetary constraints of learners and also appreciates the educational value of various courses and other forms of learning pursued by learners prior to applying to the MBA in CED. CBU has set out guidance to be followed in granting advanced standing through recognition of previous learning. The overall guiding principle is to be fair to the learner and grant credit where credit is due, and also be reasonable and not extend credit where credit is not warranted.

The integrity of the MBA in CED degree credential is paramount: Transfer credits are not extended towards any integrative-skills courses. Transfer credits are assessed against the MBA in CED fundamentals courses (5101, 5103, 5104, 5105, and 6103) typically taught in the first-semester, and the electives. The absolute maximum number of transfer credits extended cannot exceed 21 (7 half courses), and that level has rarely been reached with applicants.

Transfer Credit: Transfer Credit may be granted for equivalent courses completed at an approved, accredited university in North America, at a high achievement level (75% minimum grade achieved). Credit would be extended if the prior completed course is equivalent in content scope and

depth, level of study, assessment and outcomes. The student applies through the CBU Student Services Centre and the assessment is administered through the MBA department. A Transfer Credit Application and supporting documentation, including academic transcripts and course outlines, is reviewed by the Director of the CBU MBA in CED program in consultation with subject-area professors, and the assessment/recommendation is reviewed and approved by the Dean.

Challenge: CBU recognizes that some students may have achieved competence in certain subject areas. A challenge involves an assessment by the Director of the CBU MBA in CED program in consultation with the relevant instructor and is administered by the instructor at a time determined in consultation with the student. A specific course may be challenged only once. Students may not challenge a course for which they have already received a final grade. All course challenges will be recorded. The results of course challenges will be treated like any other course and will be included in the calculation of the student's average. Again, a *challenge* can be made against MBA in CED fundamentals courses (5101, 5103, 5104, 5105, and 6103) typically taught in the first-semester, and against the electives. A maximum of seven courses can be challenged; no student has challenged more than two MBA in CED courses to-date.

8. Class Attendance

All students are expected to attend all class meetings of the courses in which they are enrolled. However, the specific class participation policy in each course is determined by the professor.

A student may be held responsible for the work of a class missed, unless prior arrangements with the professor have been made. MBA students are mature adults and professors are aware of their work and life pressures. At the same time professors are expecting mature behavior from MBA students: acceptance of any excuse for an absence and any provision for make-up is at the discretion of the professor. Unplanned and unexplained missed classes, assignments or tests may result in a poor grade or failure.

9. Academic Integrity & Plagiarism: Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

If you have doubts on what academic integrity is and what constitutes plagiarism, this FAQ section should help.

What is academic integrity? Academic integrity is the ethical commitment to honest and responsible behaviour in all aspects of academic life. This includes the submitting of original assignments

and giving proper credit to all sources consulted. As a university student, it is your responsibility to maintain this integrity, as well as familiarize yourself with CBU's policies in regards to plagiarism and citation.

What is plagiarism? CBU's academic calendar defines plagiarism as: "The act of representing the intellectual work of others as one's own." Although it is often necessary to consult various sources of information, you must always acknowledge these sources according to the accepted practices of APA citation.

Plagiarism can be deliberate or unintentional but is still a serious offence regardless of your intent. Deliberate plagiarism involves academic dishonesty such as: buying a paper, submitting the same assignment more than once, or stealing the work of others. Unintentional plagiarism usually involves improper citation when quoting or paraphrasing. This form of plagiarism can be avoided through the use of proper APA citation. APA is the accepted citation style for CBU's Shannon School of Business. A guide for APA citation can be found at CBU Library at: https://tinyurl.com/kfnxyov For citing data use the "Citing Data and Statistics" page on the "Data and Statistics" guide at: www.libguides.cbu.ca/data.

What consequences exist for plagiarism at CBU? Plagiarism is considered a serious academic offence and the "Ethical Behaviour in Academic Matters" section of the CBU Academic Calendar (p. 41-43) outlines the policies and procedures followed in response to suspected plagiarism offences. If you are found to have committed plagiarism, a penalty will be assigned, with the maximum penalty for the first offence being a zero on the assignment. A second plagiarism offence will result in a zero in the course in which the plagiarism took place, or possibly discontinuation from CBU. A third plagiarism offence will result in discontinuation from CBU. For more information, consult the full CBU plagiarism policy or ask your instructor.

Why is plagiarism considered to be a serious offence? Plagiarism can severely impact not only your own academic reputation, but also the credibility of research done at CBU. Furthermore, plagiarism deprives the student of the full value of their education; violates the right of ownership of the original author; and deprives instructors of the ability to review the research used in preparing an assignment.

How do I avoid plagiarism? The best means of avoiding plagiarism is using proper citation, which involves the acknowledgment of sources used through both in-text citations in the body of the paper, and bibliographic citations in the reference list.

To make your life easier, consider citing your sources as you go. This can save you a lot of time and help you better organize your research. A number of online tools such as RefWorks can help you keep track of sources and format citations and reference lists.

What sources have to be cited? Any borrowed material, including: words; ideas; data and statistics; graphics and any other intellectual matter, whether drawn from print, electronic, or other non-print sources must be fully acknowledged according to the APA citation style. All outside sources, except for common knowledge, must be cited. When in doubt, cite!

What information qualifies as common knowledge? Common knowledge includes facts and other information that is widely known and can be found in many sources. In most cases, common knowledge does not need to be cited. However, students should exercise caution as there is no definitive boundary as to what constitutes common knowledge. When in doubt, cite!

May my classmates and I work together on an assignment? Depending on the course or the nature of the assignment working together on assignments may or may not be acceptable. When in doubt, ask your instructor. Whenever collaboration occurs, you should always acknowledge it in your assignment.

Where can I go for more help? If you have any questions on proper citation or how to avoid plagiarism, your professor will be able to provide guidance. You may also wish to speak with a librarian at the Research Assistance Desk in the CBU Library, or consult with CBU's Writing Centre.

II. Academic Services

1. Student Identification (ID) Card

Once registered, you can obtain your CBU student photo ID at the **Student Services Centre**, Monday to Friday between 8:30am-4:00pm. Bring valid picture identification (i.e. passport, drivers' license) with you.

This photo student ID card is also required for meal plans; use of on-campus facilities, including the Cape Breton Health Recreation Complex (under the "Campus Resources" portion, see section 6); and accessing library services. Register your student ID at CBU Library and you will receive a CAUL Library card which you can use to borrow books from the CBU Library and other academic libraries across Canada.

If you do not already have a photo student ID and are not at CBU, you can obtain an official non-photo student card. Contact Arlene Mullan at *Arlene_Mullan@cbu.ca* or phone (902) 563-1198 or 1-888-959-9995 for more information. If you are not at CBU, upon registration, you should receive, by mail, a non-photo CBU Library card and CAUL card. These two ID used with a valid picture ID, can be used to borrow books at most Canadian academic libraries

2. Library

The Library is your primary source for research resources and support. It is also a great place to study and relax. Hours of operation are posted on the Library's website: www.cbu.ca/library/hours.

If you need help getting started with your research or with using CBU Library resources or services, contact Laura Syms, Shannon School of Business (SSOB) Librarian, at *Laura_Syms@cbu.ca*, or phone (902) 563-1994 or 1-888-959-9995.

While at CBU you can get your CBU student ID card at the **Student Services Centre**. As noted, this student ID card is also a library card. If you are not at CBU, upon registration, you should receive, by mail, a non-photo CBU Library card and CAUL card, these two IDs, used with a valid picture ID, can be used to borrow books at most Canadian academic libraries.

In order to access CBU Library's online resources, you will need to identify yourself as a CBU student. There are two means of doing this. You can use your CBU webmail user name and password (see below, "IT Services", section 5.1); or you can also use the 14 digit barcode from the CBU ID that is registered at CBU Library, (see Student Identification Card, section 1, above), and the last four digits of your phone number that is registered at CBU Library.

You can also use the barcode from the CBU student ID or non-photo CBU library card and the last four digits of your phone number to log into the Interlibrary Loan [ILL] form online at http://h2.relais-host.com/asin/loginnssxPrelogin.jsp. You may want to use ILL when articles are not held by CBU Library. If the article you want is not on the database you are using, there will be a link to the ILL form by the article's description. Click this link to generate CBU's ILL form. Articles obtained through ILL usually will be delivered to you by email.

All this information and more, including resources for proper citation – learn to use Zotero (an online research management, writing and collaboration tool) – and avoiding plagiarism is explained in the **CED Research Guide**. The **CED Research Guide** provides access and information on research resources and services available, and can be found at www.libguides.cbu.ca/MBA.

3. Writing Centre

CBU's Writing Centre is in the **Learning Commons & Student Life Centre (B-110)**. It is open Monday to Friday: 9am-12pm & 1pm-4pm. The Centre offers students ways to strengthen their writing skills in free one-on-one sessions with a tutor at the Writing Centre. Students can make an appointments to discuss assignment instructions; guidelines for specific writing tasks, such as a literature review; how to organize ideas; and how to incorporate sources into a paper and cite them properly to avoid plagiarizing; along with many other writing-related topics! 4. CBU Campus Bookstore

CBU's Bookstore is adjacent to the cafeteria in the CE [Campus Expansion] building. Privacy

The CBU website is in compliance with standard university practice. Look for intimate events such as the local music, arts and culture scene, the Ideas forum and volunteer opportunities that make it easier to meet people. Cape Bretoners are welcoming and simply introducing yourself to the person seated next to you may lead to a whole new group of friends.

This section has been prepared by two former MBA students as an introductory guide to your new community. It is in no way intended to be an endorsement of the facilities or events. It is a view of the community from the perspective of two of our former students. We encourage you to do your research, explore and enjoy all that Cape Breton has to offer.

Food and Groceries

Written from the perspective of a CFA (Come From Away) student from a big city, CBRM has all you need (with the exception of a wide variety of restaurants to satisfy a global palette). Items that may be hard to find with respect to specialty shops, specialty grocery items and restaurants can be found during weekend trips to Halifax or in care packages from home.

- **No Frills** is the closest grocery store to the university on Grand Lake Road. You can get your basic foods there and pretty good deals (dollar days are exactly as they say, but the food is not necessarily healthful).
- Close to No Frills and on the opposite side of the road there is a Bulk Barn which carries
 everything from soup to nuts; candy and snacks; baking ingredients, spices; coffees;, teas; and
 more. Plus, since you are buying in bulk, you can purchase in small or large quantities.
- The Co-Op is at the corner of Victoria Rd and Grand Lake Rd. You can purchase from there even if you are not a member, but if you are a member you receive special discounts, dividends at the end of year and you are supporting a community-based enterprise.
- A recent addition to the area is the **Camel Food Market** located at 269 Townsend Street, Sydney (902) 539-0854. Specializing in ethic foods; further information is available on their facebook page.

- Sobeys is located on Prince Street, which is a continuation of Grand Lake Rd (heading towards downtown Sydney). Sobeys has an excellent selection and a great sushi bar!
- The Atlantic Superstore is located in Sydney River on Kings Rd., 1 km from Sydney (close to downtown Sydney). They too have a large selection and provide a 10% discount to students with ID on Tuesdays.
- There is also a small but very good natural food store called Charlene's Nutrition Centre,
 located on King's Rd, where you can get many specialty dietary items.
- In Glace Bay, the Sobeys and the Atlantic Superstore are both located on Reserve Street
 (opposite sides) and accessible by the CBU bus. There is also a Sobeys on Emerald Street in New
 Waterford.
- The Cape Breton Farmer's Market, www.cbfarmersmarket.com, is located in Sydney River and well worth the trip! It is as much a social gathering as it is an opportunity to get some fresh and locally grown food. The market runs on Saturday from 8:30 am -1:30 pm, on 340 Keltic Drive
- The Downtown Sydney Farmer's Market, on the corner of George and Pitt Street, Sydney www.downtownsydneyfarmersmarket.wordpress.com, is a smaller market that runs on Saturdays from 1pm to 4pm only during the summer months.
- Alcohol is sold in retail stores almost exclusively owned and operated by the provincial
 government through the Nova Scotia Liquor Commission (NSLC). Many of these stores are
 attached to grocery stores. Some independent retailers, such as vineyards, are permitted to sell
 alcohol, as well as some stores in rural communities.

Side Note: Lobster Season: If you're here in July, you will no doubt experience George's famous MBA 'Lobster Do'! But if one feast just won't satisfy those seafood cravings (and we can't blame you!), there are plenty of other opportunities!

Here's a little gem especially for those of you with wheels: Mac's Convenience Store on George Street (beside Wentworth Park) sells Main-a-Dieu lobsters throughout the lobster season (early May to mid July). You can buy fresh cooked or uncooked lobster by the pound from the little hut next to the store. Pack a lobster cracker (a nut cracker and some elbow grease will usually suffice), some sides and a cold drink and treat yourself to a picnic in the park. When Cape Bretoners sit down to a feed of lobsters, it's a pretty standard fare. Salads, including potato and macaroni, soft rolls and often some melted butter for dipping rounds out the meal. But it's all for naught if you can't get to that delicious meat. So here's a good guide to how to get that shell off without too many cuts to the hands and lobster juice to the eyes!

Coffee

With so many papers, exams, presentations, early mornings, late nights and yes, group work...unless you're one of those special people who manage to remain productive without caffeine; you're going to want to pay close attention to this section.

- Roasters and Caper Corner have coffee cards that let you earn stamps towards a free coffee, just ask for one. There are fair trade coffee options and you can use your reusable mug.
- Outside of the cafeteria, meal hall and Roasters, Caper Corner (the Student Union convenience store) is the only place on campus to get a cup o' jo (coffee) on the weekends.
- Just down the road from CBU, towards Sydney, (walking distance) is a Tim Horton's at the
 Ultramar gas stop. If you're not from Canada, you may not be familiar with Tim Horton's, a
 national coffee chain that is now expanding into the US, but you will see one almost everywhere
 you go. Tim's or 'Timmy's' offer late hours but no WiFi.

There are also several independent coffee shops, some with WiFi, located in the Sydney downtown and south end area:

- Wentworth Perk, <u>www.wentworthperk.com</u>, or 'the Perk' is located across the street from Wentworth Park on George Street. This shop offers free WiFi, a great deck and lots of drink and food options.
- Doktor Luke's, https://www.facebook.com/doktorlukes, is located near Wentworth Park at 40 Kings Rd, Sydney, NS B1S 1A1
- The Bean Bank Café and Catering, <u>www.beanbank.ca</u>, is another great option located downtown Sydney on Charlotte Street. This café also offers a wide menu, WiFi and a small sidewalk patio.
- Cape Breton Fudge Co., <u>www.capebretonfudgeco.com</u>, located in the bottom of Smart Shop
 Place (Charlotte Street, Sydney), also has a café and offers live music on occasion.

The only movie theatre in Cape Breton is **Cineplex Cinemas Sydney**, located on Prince Street, Sydney. **Boston Pizza** shares the same parking lot making it a convenient pre- or post-movie stop.

The **Cape Breton Drive-In Theatre** is a fun and unique experience! Open May to the holiday weekend in October, the Drive-In is located on Sydney-Glace Bay Highway, between the Mayflower Mall and CBU. You and a carload of your friends can enjoy at least two movies \$17.99. Check out their sign, website or Facebook Page for current movies www.capebretondriveintheatre.com.

Music

Cape Breton is replete with musicians and great music. If you like live music and a good variety there are many options throughout the region. One popular option is **Governor's Pub and Eatery,** www.governorseatery.com, on The Esplanade (restaurant downstairs, pub upstairs). To check out all of the other great venues on the web at www.whatsgoinon.ca/.

The biggest music event on the island by far is the annual Celtic Colours International Festival www.celtic-colours.com. This year's festival is October 10-18 with venues all over the island.

A few smaller venues now offer local music including:

Wentworth Perk on George Street hosts musicians on a fairly regular basis, just check out their Facebook group for upcoming events on the board in the café. The Cape Breton Fudge Co. downtown Sydney also plays host to musicians, check their website for details. The Fox Den, 451 Prince Street, serves food, drink, and entertainment. And, The Old Triangle Irish Alehouse, 424 Charlotte Street, also has entertainment.

If you are looking for an earthy experience you can check out the **Elk's Club**, located on Bentinck Street. Information about what is on at the Elk's is usually word of mouth. If you use facebook and twitter we recommend you consider checking out some of these sites on-line. It is a quick and easy way to stay connected.

There are a few options for sports bars. In Sydney there's **Boston Pizza**, on Prince Street (beside the movie theatre), **Steel City Sports Bar**, on Townsend Street and **Don Cherry**'s on King's Rd are all options as is the **Main Event** in Glace Bay.

More Entertainment Options

Cape Breton Centre for Craft and Design, www.capebretoncraft.com, is a very cool spot located on Charlotte Street, Sydney. There's an artist's gallery downstairs (yes, you can buy their wares!) and space for studios, workshop and meetings. Courses and workshop are offered throughout the year; check the website for further details.

Ideas Powered by Passion is a speaker's series that runs monthly (Fall thru Spring) at the Cape Breton Centre for Social Innovation, 39 Nepean St. Sydney. Hosted by New Dawn Enterprises Ltd, Canada's oldest community corporation, it features leaders and musicians from Cape Breton. It is a free event and runs from 7-9 pm (the coffee and tea are free; just bring your own mug). It is also a unique and wonderful opportunity to network with people from the region and to learn about community economic development in action on the island. Techsocial, hosted by Innovacorp, is a "monthly meeting for those with an interest in technology and innovation in Cape Breton". If this sounds like you, check out http://www.tecsocial.ca/ for events and updates.

Shopping

Downtown Sydney http://tinyurl.com/bus3z3h has many independent retailers. Downtown Glace Bay also has a small selection of shops. Located only three kilometers from the university (towards Sydney), the Mayflower Mall, www.mayflowermall.com, has over 70 stores with a food court,

restaurants and several anchor stores including **The Bay, Future Shop, Staples** and **Winners**. Across the highway from the Mayflower Mall is a small commercial park with a **Wal-mart, Canadian Tire, Home Depot** and several smaller retailers. There is another **Wal-mart** in the Cape Breton Plaza on Keltic Dr,

Sydney River and a **Zellers** store near the Sobeys on Prince Street.

The Cape Breton Shopping Plaza on Keltic Drive in Sydney River has several stores including Dollarama, Value Village, Wal-mart and Sobeys. A Dollarama, often a stop for students stocking up on cheap basics, and the Bulk Barn, are located next to each on Welton Street near the No Frills. If you're looking for a guided tour, instruction or rentals, several kayak operators offer just that and not too far off the beaten path. North River Kayaks www.northriverkayak.com and Rising Tide Expeditions www.risingtideexpeditions.ca are two well-known operators that could help you get started.

Wildlife

Two Rivers Wildlife Park, www.tworiverspark.ca, on the Mira River is open all year long and run by a community non-profit organization. There are activities for all ages and all seasons and over 500 acres of park to explore. In addition to visiting with the wildlife, there really is an amazing offering of activities: swimming, paddle boats, wagon rides, camping, cross country skiing (rentals available), skating, ice fishing and sleigh rides! You'll need a car to get there but it's not a terribly long a trip, approximately 27 kilometers from CBU. Adult admission is \$6.50 or \$30.00 for a year pass.

Restaurants

There are plenty of restaurants to choose from, however, you may find the selection of international fare a bit limited. That said, recent years have seen a vast improvement in eating-out options and students can find a decent variety from pizza (we love our pizza!) and donairs, to traditional pub and seafood menus, to Greek, Middle Eastern and Indian cuisine.

The closest restaurant to the university is **Flavor 19**, <u>www.cbflavor.com/nineteen</u>, located across the highway from the university at the **Lingan Golf and Country Club**. This restaurant has a wide menu including a burger bar, a patio overlooking the greens and often hosts musical entertainment.

Getting Around

Students' Notes: Road/street naming is a bit odd. CBU is on Grand Lake Road. If you turn left at CBU's lights, you are heading toward Sydney and the same road turns into Welton Street and then to Prince Street before ending in downtown Sydney. If you turn right at the lights, you are heading to the airport and ultimately Glace Bay where the same road turns into Reserve Street, Glace Bay. As well, the Esplanade in downtown Sydney turns into Kings Road which runs out to Sydney River before turning into beautiful Route 4 Highway which will take you to Saint Peters' and beyond along the Bras d'Or Lakes.

Active Transportation: The Cape Breton Regional Municipality has an Active Transportation Plan and the website includes information on the new bike lane on George Street and a map of cycling routes throughout CBRM. www.cbrm.ns.ca/active-transportation.html. CBRM transit buses also have bike racks so that you can bike part of your route. Joining up with Velo Cape Breton is a great way to get active, explore the island and make new friends. Membership is only \$10, check out their website for more details. www.velocapebreton.ca/. Framework Cycle and Fitness on Townsend Street, Sydney, is another resource to get you started with biking www.frameworkfitness.com/.

Local Buses: Between Monday and Friday, Route 1 (CBU) buses leaving CBU for Sydney start with a 7:25am departure and the last bus of the night leaves at 9:30pm. Buses leaving CBU for Glace start at 7:40am with a last departure at 10:30pm. Saturday's schedule is similar but a few of the regular stops do not run. Buses do not run on Sundays! There are several other bus routes to surrounding communities and neighborhoods within the Sydney area. Schedules vary; please check the CBRM Transit website for further details. www.cbrm.ns.ca/transit.html.

Students can buy discounted tickets (individual or a book of 20) from Caper Convenience for only \$1.50 each. The store also has printed bus schedules available. Student bus passes can be purchased from the Student's Union for \$45/month. Buses depart CBU from the bus stop in front of the Canada Games Complex (near the Subway) and they have bike racks on the front for those of you who wish to bike part of the way!

Non-local Bus Service: Maritime Bus, www.maritimebus.com/, is a long distance bus service with stops throughout Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. Students receive discounted fares with their photo student ID. See their website to purchase tickets and check the schedule.

Shuttle Services: There are several shuttle service operators in the CBRM. These shuttles are usually independently owned operated and most offer a daily service between Cape Breton and Halifax (or Halifax airport). Routes, pick and drop off locations, prices, and schedules may vary between operators. Many services are available online but some things will require a trip to the customer service at Access Nova Scotia Centre located at 380 Kings Road in Sydney.
